In the year of the 80th anniversary of the D-day landings, what could be more appropriate than a newsletter full mainly with recently released examples of Kipling family service in the Second World War.

Kiplings in the Durham Home Guard – update

These records are released 100 years after the birth of the soldier. The first batch was reported in Newsletter #22 (see <u>Kiplings in the Durham Home Guard.pdf</u> for all). Now those born up to 1924 can be examined. The most recently released was that of John James Kipling of the **David** family group. At the outbreak of war, he was a 14-year-old newspaper delivery boy.



Bob Kipling's War

My late father Robert Furze Spencer Kipling (not 'Purse' as the record below mistakenly has it) of the **Barningham** family group, served in the RAF during WW2. The beginning of his official record is below.



He first volunteered in 1942. He was assessed as suitable for pilot training, and placed in the RAF Volunteer Reserve, continuing his civilian work but training in the evenings with the Air Training Corps. He was eventually called up in 1944, but was trained as a motor transport driver, not a pilot. In 1945, he trained as an aircrew wireless operator at RAF Madley in Herefordshire, being promoted temporary sergeant. He trained on board de Havilland Dominies and Percival Proctors. However, the war ended and there was no further need for flight crew, so he was reassigned to movement contol, including disembarking returning servicemen at Liverpool docks, until 1947. Losing his temporary aircrew rank, he ended his service as Leading Aircraftsman and temporary corporal. A selection of the documents he retained are shown below.

1944 WW2 Deaths

Corporal Peter Neville Kipling

Peter was the third son of Robert and Rosa Kate Kipling of the **Dean** family group to be killed in the war. He had been married to Dora Green for less than four months. He is buried in Broomfield (St. Mary) churchyard, where his memorail stone is inscribed 'HIS TWIN BROTHERS BERNARD AND GUY WERE LOST ON AIR OPERATIONS. IN PROUD AND LOVING MEMORY'

DISPATCH RIDER'S DEATH

In Collision With Armoured

An army dispatch rider, Cpl. Peter Neville Kipling, aged 22, of the Royal Service Corps, who was riding a motor cycle at Putney Hill on Priday, was in collision with an armoured car. He was taken to hospital, where he died next morning.

The inquest was held at Battersea Coroner's Court on Monday. It was stated that the armoured car was travelling through St. John's-avenue, Putney, and at the junction of Putney, Bull the accident occurred.

Cpl. G. Allen of the Royal Armoured Corps, said the driver of the armoured car, of which witness was an occupant, had restricted vision. The driver could see only to the front and not to the sides. Consequently a "look-out" man was posted in every car. At the time of the accident witness was the "look-out" man.

Continuing, he said the car, while coming through St. John's-avenue, pulled up behind a stationary A.R.P. vehicle. When this vehicle eventually moved he instructed his own driver to follow suit. A few minutes later he heard a "terrine noise," and saw a soldier flying through the air. "The dispatch rider seemed to come from nowhere," he added. "It all happened in a moment."

Sergt. George Craig, R.A.C., the driver of the car, said that he was being guided by Cpl. Allen. The only indication he had of something abnormal occurring was when he felt the steering wheel torn from his graen.

Inspector Alexander Taylor, of the Special Constabulary, said he was about a hundred yards from the accident and saw deceased lying in the road. He phoned for an ambulance.

Dr. Teare, pathologist, said deceased died from a fractured skull. The deputy coroner (Mr. J. W.

The deputy coroner (Mr. J. W. Hulme) recorded a verdict of "Accidental Death."


Private Sidney Kipling


Sidney was from the **Stackholm** Kipling family group, son of Joseph and Louisa Kipling of South Church, Durham, and brother to Sgt. Fred Kipling who had been killed the previous year (see above). He joined the 10th Battalion, Durham Light Infantry. They arrived on the Normady beaches on 12 June, six days after D-day, and went into action inland some days later. Sidney was killed in on 28 June 1944 when the battalion was attacking the village of Rauray. He was aged just 19. He is buried in Hottot-les-Bagues Cemtery, 14km south-east of Bayeux.



Kiplings in the Women's Land Army

The records of six Kipling women who served in the Women's Land Army have also been released. This was a service, initially voluntary but later conscripted, in which women replaced men fighting the war in agricultural work. It did exist during the later part of WW1 but was revived at the outbreak of WW2. Two cards are shown below.





The first is that of Gwendoline Kipling of London N16 of the **Dean** family group, a tailor's machinist at the outbreak of war and subsequently a temporary hospital orderly.

She joined the WLA in May 1943, aged 20 and was sent to Wiltshire. She resigned on medical grounds at the end of that year

The other is for Vivien Eugenie Kipling, also of the **Dean** family group, and daughter of John Covington Kipling and his wife Gertrude (nee Joyce), served for a much longer time, joining in 1940 and remaining until the day the WLA was finally stood down (30 Nov 1950). Originally serving in her home county of Hertfordshire, she also worked in Suffolk and Huntingdonshire. The record card notes her involvement with poultry, something she was already doing in 1939.

A typical tracer card and attestation record are those of Arthur William Kipling. Neither unfortunately provide enough information to identify which Arthur William it might be, there being at least two of military age.





Past and future poets!

Robert Burns Kipling was born in Valpariso, Ind., March 16, 1844, and departed this life at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ed. Hansen in Ord, Saturday, April 17, 1920, aged 76 years, 1 month and 1 day old. He was buried in the Ord cemetery yes-

was buried in the Ord cemetery yesterday, the funeral being held from the home of his daughter. Rev. Hosman of the Methodist church officia-

Mr. Kipling lived, with his parents at Valpariso until he was ten years of age when both parents died. He then went to sea with an older brother and followed that calling until the call came for volunters for the Civil war when he enlisted and served his country until the close of the war. He then went back to the sea until 1868. He was then married and lived on a farm in Ilinois for eight years. Three sons were born to them. Then they separated and Mr. Kipling came west to Saunders county, Nebraska, in 1876 and he

county, Nebraska, in 1876 and he worked on a farm for Thompson Bissell for two years when he was married to Miss Jane Bissell and they moved onto a Saunders county farm which was their home until 1889 when they again moved westward, locating in Valley county. This was their home until 1894 when Mrs. Kipling died. Five boys and three girls had been born to them, two of the boys dying in infancy. The family continued to live in Valley county until 1903, when they moved to Garfield county, later moving back to Ord. In 1911 Mr. Kipling went to Canada where some of the boys were located and since then he has made his home with his children most of the time. A few weeks ago he came here for a visit and since coming his health completely broke down-Ord Quiz.

Robert Burns Kipling was born 46 years after the death of the Scottish poet and 42 years before Rudyard Kipling published his first volume of poems. He was from the **Staindrop** family group.
